OVERVIEW

WE ARE A YOUNG BUT RAPIDLY GROWING GENOCIDE PREVENTION NGO THAT OFFERS A UNIQUE PERSPECTIVE

for The Lemkin Institute Genocide Prevention (LIPG) works with people around the world to promote genocide prevention, human security, restorative dialogue, mental health literacy, and peace-building education and training as well as to offer tools for grassroots responses to conflict. In the process, we seek to inform the world about global grassroots efforts to end the cycle of genocide. We are driven by the belief that the most important prevention work happens at the grassroots level. Our approach to human security is based in the observation that true long-term human security grows from the grassroots and is built over time through broad-based internal social and cultural commitments to justice.





WHO WE ARE

The Lemkin Institute is an independent non-profit organization working directly with people from all walks of life to create the knowledge and tools necessary for genocide prevention in local, national, regional, and international contexts. We are feminist, anti-racist, and non-aligned in the work that we do.

Connecting the global grassroots with the tools of genocide prevention.

A world consensus to abstain from genocide.

We work according to our 11 Principles of Genocide Prevention. Every project that we undertake is measured in accordance with these principles and we hold our partners to the same high standard.





ACTIVITIES

2021 was a year of rapid growth for the Institute. We became registered in the US state of Pennsylvania as a charity and are in the process of obtaining official 501(c)(3) recognition as a non-profit in the US.

The start of the global Coronavirus pandemic in 2020 encouraged us to become creative in using online media to do our work.

In March 2021 we revamped our website and initiated new projects that would allow us to continue our genocide prevention outreach and education in the limited physical world of social distancing.

These projects included two podcasts (The Anti-Genocide Coffee Break: A Multinational Podcast and Genocide News Now!); the web-based Genocide Prevention Toolbox; social media "microcourses"; statements; reports; a website-based newsfeed; a free, online genocide prevention course called "

Genocide Prevention: The Basics"; and other online educational resources. As part of our new programs, we began to conduct outreach outside of Iraq, emphasizing regions that were facing troubling stressors and threats, including the USA, Afghanistan, Armenia, Bangladesh, Colombia, Ethiopia, Myanmar, and Sudan.

We developed partnerships with many NGOs working on genocide prevention and commemoration, including Genocide Watch, the Darfur Women Action Group, the Shlomo Organization for Documentation, Justice for the Victims of the 1988 Massacre in Iran, the Bangladesh Liberation War Museum, and several human rights activists working in conflicts around the world.

We employed 11 student interns from three different universities. They included graduates of Keene State College's Holocaust and Genocide Studies major; undergraduates at Keene State College; graduate students at New York University; and graduate students at George Mason University's Carter School for Peace and Conflict Resolution.



WHAT'S NEXT?

For 2022, our goal is to attain funding for our work that will allow us to employ a full-time project manager and scale up our work. If the pandemic permits, we plan to resume travel to threatened Armenia, Burundi, countries (Iraq, Ethiopia, Sudan/Chad, India) to conduct genocide prevention trainings across a variety of organizations and groups and in order to build local capacity. We also plan to expand our online and in-person resources and produce them in several languages other than including Mandarin, Spanish, English, French. Arabic, Russian, and Hindi. We plan to step up all of our current projects, increasing them in number and in reach, and will add new projects, such as quarterly online conversations, symposia, and conferences on difficult subjects in genocide prevention and human security.
